TRÓCAIRE LENTEN APPEAL 2018

Trócaire was established by the Catholic Bishops of Ireland in 1973 as a way for Irish people to donate to development and emergency relief overseas. Most of us are now so familiar with Trócaire that we automatically associate Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent, with getting the Trócaire box and putting on the kitchen table or window sill. What we not are aware of is the work Trócaire does has expanded beyond the primary focus of the countries of Africa and now Trócaire works in every continent of the world. The work Trócaire does can vary from emergency supplies to farm education to creating awareness about global warming.

Trócaire Involvement with Rohingya Refugee Camps: Along a small strip of land on Bangladesh's south-east coast lie the Rohingya refugee camps. Military check points prevent the Rohingya people from dispersing further across the country. Despite the efforts of those working in the camps, conditions are appalling and likely to worsen still. Over 860,000 Rohingya live on rugged land covering 15km by 12km. Over 620,000 people have arrived since last August alone, overwhelming the already existing camps and those trying to help. Most people who arrive are in very poor health, having made long and dangerous journeys to reach the camps. Malnutrition and diseases such as cholera are widespread.

Trócaire is responding through Caritas Bangladesh and is providing thousands of refugees with food, clean water, shelter, pots, pans, blankets and sleeping mats. Shawkat Ava is 37 years old and five months pregnant. For the last three and a half months, the Kutupalong refugee camp has been home for her and her husband. "They attacked us in the night," she says. "We saw what they did with our own eyes. Our village was burning. They asked boys who were around 10 and 11 years old to stand in a line. Then they chased them with machetes. One old neighbour of ours was shot. He was just an old man. "Everybody just ran. I was shivering all the time. It made me sick. My hand was broken when I crawled in the jungle. We were hungry for many days when we first escaped. We hid in the bush for 15 days. "We got some help when escaping. There are some good people in Myanmar. Some gave us food, shelter and helped us. In Bangladesh, they have helped us a lot. "I brought nothing from home. When I first came here I had to sell my nose stud to buy food. Then the community here helped us. I have received food and cooking utensils from Caritas Bangladesh." Trócaire is working closely with Caritas Bangladesh to help some of the most vulnerable refugees. Caritas have provided rice, lentils, sugar and oil, as well as plates, saucepans, glasses and cooking utensils to over 40,000 families. We're also just about to distribute blankets and sleeping mats to 14,600 families so they can keep warm at night.

While very basic, these items have given many Rohingya families the help they need to get by day to day, and a little space to grieve their loss of family, friends and home.

Trócaire support through Caritas Bangladesh: 240,000 people have received food aid. 87,000 people will receive winter kits – blankets, sleeping mats, floor mats.

THE 70th MIRACLE AT LOURDES - A GOOD NEWS STORY: The case of a French nun who recovered from a decades-old back problem that prevented her from walking normally has been recognised as the 70th miracle at France's shrine of Lourdes. Lourdes is one of the most revered sites for the world's 1.2 billion Catholics because the town is said to be where the Virgin Mary appeared to a peasant girl in a grotto. Sister Bernadette Moriau from northern France visited the holy spring in the foothills of the Pyrenees mountains in July 2008, then aged 69, seeking a cure to her ailment like millions of other pilgrims each year. Shortly after returning home, her chronic sciatica or pinched spinal nerve disappeared for the first time since her condition was diagnosed at the age of 27. Today she said: "Then I heard a voice saying 'Remove the apparatus'.

What happened? I don't know. I don't know. "In an act of faith I took everything off and I thought of the words of Jesus in the Gospel when he says 'Pick up your mat and walk'. "And to my great surprise when I took away my girdle and my splints, my foot was straightened out and I could move without feeling any pain." She added: "The following day I went and walked five kilometres in the forest with my sister-in-law who came to see me, who, to her great surprise saw me without all the equipment. "And I cried a lot, I cried a lot because we're overwhelmed by what happens to us." Sister Bernadette had undergone four unsuccessful operations. "She experienced an unusual feeling of relaxation and heat in the whole of her body (and) heard a voice telling her to take off her equipment, the corset and the leg brace," said a statement from her Catholic parish in Beauvais in the north of France. After further examinations by doctors and three meetings of church figures in Lourdes, the medical committee in the town confirmed that her recovery could not be explained scientifically, according to their statement. "Sister Bernadette Moriau now has a perfectly normal life," the committee's president Alessandro de Franciscis told AFP. "She is in very good health and she visits the sick on a regular basis."
